New ADA Rules Take Effect In March

The Department of Justice published revised final regulations implementing title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) on September 15, 2010. The regulations update the 1991 ADA standards for making buildings accessible for people with disabilities. It applies to private entities with public accommodations (that is, places open to the public) and commercial facilities. The effective date of this regulation is March 15, 2011. This is separate from the compliance dates outlined in the website listed below.

The Department of Justice will post a Small Business Compliance Guide for these regulations pursuant to the Regulatory Flexibility Act on March 15 on the website www.ada.gov

Earth Day, Every Day: Energy-saving Green Tech

In addition to reducing costs for energy and waste disposal, and improving productivity, companies that embrace environmentally friendly information technology – also known as green IT – are often recognized as responsible community leaders.

Buying green

When purchasing IT equipment, focus on energy-efficient products and on reconfiguring equipment to reduce power consumption and waste while improving productivity:

Replace CRT monitors with LCD monitors, which can save as much as 70 percent in related energy costs.

Consider ENERGY STAR® and Electronic Product Environmental Assessment Tool (EPEAT) products. These products are tested and certified to be more energy efficient than standard equipment.

Purchase multi-functional equipment rather than individual

printers, fax machines, scanners and copiers.

Recycling, disposal

Green IT practices that encourage recycling and proper disposal contribute significantly to environmental sustainability and reduced operating costs.

To learn more about recycling electronics, check the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's eCycling pages at www.epa.gov.

When disposing of equipment it is important to protect sensitive data. Moreover, equipment disposal must be in compliance with government environmental regulations. Consider using a reputable IT asset disposal provider to manage the process.

Reconnected Tax Codes Bring Relief to Local Businesses

(March 12, 2011 – Lincoln City, OR) Local businesses and individuals can now file their tax returns with the State of Oregon without amending them later or wondering if they paid too much tax to the State.

Governor Kitzhaber signed into law the fiercely debated Senate Bill 301 which re-aligns Oregon's tax code with major portions of the federal tax code. The situation was due to Oregon lawmakers' 2009 vote to disconnect Oregon's code from federal code in an effort to close a gap in Oregon's budget.

The legislative stall in Salem and recent federal law changes created mass confusion for businesses and tax preparers all over the state. Even the IRS told tens of millions of Americans to wait to file their tax returns due to last minute haggling in Congress last December. The IRS needed until February 15 to update their software programs to include the changes that Congress had voted on.

"The bottom line is that businesses had to wait to file their tax returns," says Misty Ness, an accountant at Bryan P. Fitzsimmons, CPA. "After waiting for the IRS to get their act together, now we had to wait on the State to see what they were going to do," said Ness. "Oregon was still disconnected from the

new federal code and every tax preparer in the state was waiting to see what would happen."

The new legislation allows Oregon businesses to write off more start-up costs, will allow accelerated depreciation to be written off starting in 2011 and other provisions that will help businesses. It is expected that \$93,000,000 will be put back into Oregon's economy as a result.

"Lincoln County has been especially hard hit by the bad economy," says Ness. "Sometimes it makes all the difference for our businesses to get these sorts of breaks. In this area and this economy, it could mean the difference between laying off employees or actually hiring another one. Or even between staying in business and closing shop."

Other portions of Senate Bill 301 allow families to deduct up to \$4000 from college tuition and allow parents to keep their children on their health plans until the age of 26 tax free. Teachers are also eligible for deductions of classroom expenses. To learn more about the new tax code legislation visit www.oregon.gov/DOR/, www.leg.state.or.us/ or talk to your tax preparer.

Linda's Last Lines

This is usually the place where I wrap things up with some sort of witty something or other but in light of our recent experience with the earthquake and tsunami in Japan and our own warnings I am posting an invitation to attend SET Classes from Captain Jim Kusz, Public, Education and Safety Officer who serves Depoe Bay and North Lincoln Fire & Rescue's Districts.

Free classes for public on Tsunami safety, awareness and evacuation being conducted in Depoe Bay and North Lincoln Fire & Rescue's Districts starting April 2, 2011.

Tsunami Ready? Get S.E.T. (Severe Event Training)

Free training offered beginning April 2, 2011 Depoe Bay Fire & Rescue District.

On March 11, 2011, the entire coast and the state of Oregon was put to the test. How well prepared are responders, our government officials and, most importantly, our residents (you) for a tsunami? These and many other questions have emerged since March 11 in

numerous debriefings, at the district, city, county and state level.

In a meeting I attended with Senator Ron Wyden, and a small group of county and city officials, on Saturday March 19, it was obvious that more had to be done on the state and local level. But more concerning was that much more needed to be done at the individual level. Most of our residents and visitors have gotten the message, but many fell short or did not understand what appropriate action to take in case of a Tsunami.

First, let's revisit what to do in case of a Local Tsunami and Distant Tsunami:

Local Tsunami

If the ground shakes, Drop, Cover, Hold, and immediately go to high ground as soon as you are able to stay on your feet.

There most likely will not be an official warning or siren.

You should already know your nearest assembly area in case of disaster and already have a survival kit ready to grab as you leave.

You will have only a few minutes to make it to high ground (65

ft or more above high tide level).

Do not drive, as streets will be blocked by trees, poles, and your car will become debris that will do more damage.

If you are at high ground, stay there.

Distant Tsunami

If you hear an announcement (NOAA alert radio, NIXLE message, tsunami siren or verbal warning), it means that an earthquake has happened at some distance away that may produce a tsunami in our area within a few hours.

Don't panic, get off the beach, low lying areas, or the evacuation area, get your things together, plan to be gone for at least 24 hours, and go to high ground.

If you are at high ground, stay there.

If a tsunami does hit the area, there may be several waves with subsequent waves or sea surges being higher than the first.

Remain out of the inundation area until the all clear is issued by local emergency officials.

After reviewing state and county reports to officials about residents' response to the Japan earth-

quake and tsunami that arrived on our coast, it was found that many residents acted swiftly and had made provisions to evacuate. Yet sadly, many had not planned or even knew what was the first action step to take. Individuals called police and fire stations, and emergency 9-1-1 operators asking "What to do?" and/or "Where is high ground?" These questions added to the workload of these already overwhelmed responders.

Depoe Bay Fire & Rescue personnel wants everyone to be safe and to feel secure in times of emergency or a severe event. That is why we are offering free S.E.T. "Severe Event Training" at the Gleneden Beach Station starting April 2nd, at 9 AM.

What is S.E.T.?

To assist in understanding and prepare for what natural threats visit our region, we've established the Severe Event Training Program and accompanying S.E.T. book. This program looks at different scenarios from winter storms, floods, wildfire, earthquake and tsunami, to mention a few.

The S.E.T. book helps you plan

ways to "weather" these events and create different strategies for your unique situation. It helps you build your "Survival Kit" and gives life-saving information on earthquake and tsunami preparedness for your home, work, family, and community.

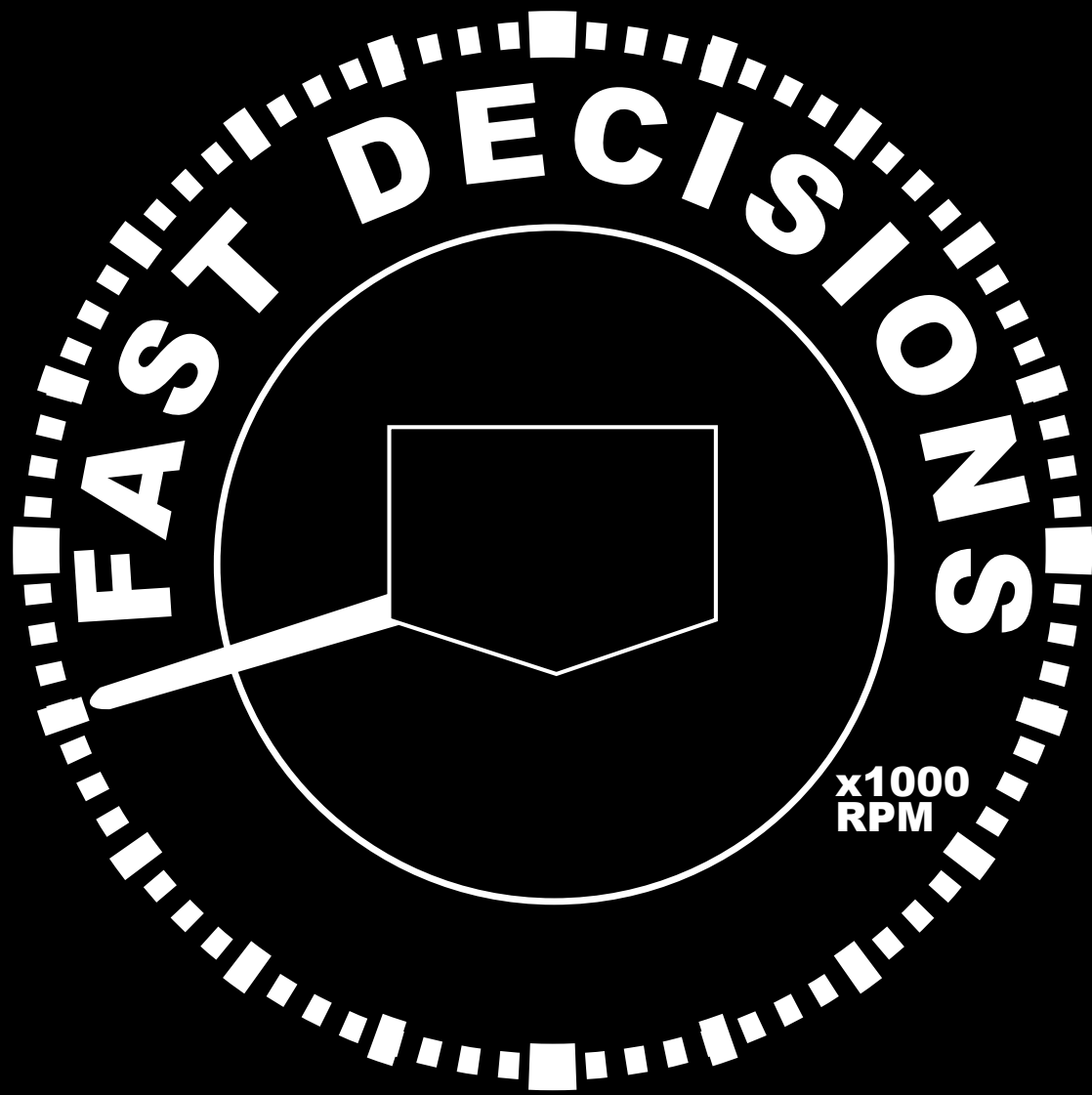
